



Welcome to Yardley, Pennsylvania

Here's a to-do list if you find yourself looking to explore the local area.

Places to eat

- [Pretty Bird Coffee](#) is a brief stroll across the street, a great place for a homemade doughnut and espresso. At night, they convert the same space into a great sushi restaurant.
- [Red House](#) is also very close, they smoke their own brisket and offer a range of meals. The folks there are very accommodating to those with dietary restrictions.
- [Charcoal BYOB](#) has been around since we can remember. They are a great place for brunch, situated along the Delaware River. If you get there early enough, securing a seat by the window offers a peaceful view of the river.
- [Canal Street Grille](#) is right next door. It is a BYOB and they offer great Greek cuisine--highly recommend the Lamb Gyro and Greek Salad.
- There are quite a few pizza spots within walking distance. We tend to like the tomato pie at Franco's, but you can't go wrong with any of the local pizza options.
- [Mil-Lee's Diner](#) on Main Street is a quaint eatery with a homey vibe serving classic diner fare for breakfast and lunch.
- [The Continental Tavern](#) on Main Street serves old style tavern fare overlooking Lake Afton. A tavern since the 1860's, the Continental was part of the Underground Railroad.
- [Cafe Antonio](#) is a short drive down the Delaware river and is a classic Italian-American spot to dine in or grab to-go.
- [Bagel Train](#) is a local favorite grab and go counter for homemade bagel sandwiches and hot coffee.
- [Wawa](#) of course needs no introduction, there's one very close by on Main Street, and there's a [CVS](#) right up the street if you need toiletries or medications and the like. Both have ATM machines.
- [Yardley Ice House](#) is a summer tradition in the area, serving hand made Italian Water Ice and Soft Serve ice cream(right behind Mil-Lee's).

Places to drink

- [The Cellar](#) is a limited-seating cocktail bar which is open on the weekends, just outside your door.
- [Vault Brewery](#) is just across the street from you, on Main Street. They offer a range of rotating beers and food for lunch and dinner. The bar is built in what used to be a bank and the original bank vault still stands, hence the name. They host live music occasionally. They also sell take out beer.
- [Vault Taproom](#) is a stroll up College Avenue and offers big screen TV's featuring sporting events, beer, wine, cocktails and tapas. They are open Thurs-Sunday.
- [The Yardley Inn](#) is a long-running full restaurant and cocktail bar. We usually stop in for a martini before or after a night out. A good place to celebrate a special occasion.
- [Fine Wine and Good Spirits](#) at 7 Buttonwood Ave (walking distance) sells liquor and wine.

Places to visit and things to do

- The Delaware Canal just outside your door has a historical towpath alongside it. It's a perfect trail to run, walk, or bike any time of day. This is a great way to see the leaves change color, some historical structures, and baby ducks running around. You can ride to Historic Washingtons Crossing State Park and all the way to New Hope.
- [Commonplace Reader](#) is a sweet bookshop on Main St. offering a range of contemporary books and classics. They sell artwork from local artists as well.
- [The Yardley Farmers Market](#) is hosted at Buttonwood Park from May to November 21st on Saturdays from 9AM-12PM, a good place to get some seasonal meat and produce.
- [Yardley General](#) up on Main Street is the perfect place for gifts, local wine, and dry artisan goods.
- Up the river in [New Hope](#), is a strip of great bars and restaurants, art galleries, coffee, breweries, and wine bars. It's a good place to visit for a day or for the night life. It's a beautiful drive, especially in the fall, surrounded by old, tall trees.
- A short walk across the river from New Hope is [Lambertville](#), an equally exciting and youthful town with plenty to see and do for a day.
- On your way to New Hope, you might stop in [Washington Crossing](#) the historic site where George Washington crossed the Delaware. They host revolutionary war reenactments here, and it's a good place to see some old American architecture. [The Washington Crossing Inn](#) is a restaurant here, situated inside a house built in 1817.
- [Tyler State Park](#) is a short drive away. It's a fantastic place any time of year to hike secluded trails, see the local wildlife, and ride horses.
- [Shady Brook Farm](#) is a short drive away with a large farmers market. They always have something going on, from the famous drive-through light show during the winter, to the

haunted hayride and haunted house during halloween. Check out their website to see what they're hosting. (We usually go to pick up a few tubs of their Gourmet Ice Cream.)

- The Yardley Train Station is just up main street. It's walkable, but better to drive. You can get into Philadelphia from that train station. We like using the train so we can have a long night out in the city. From Reading Terminal Market, to the Barnes Foundation, to the Rodin Museum it's hard to go wrong if you decide to spend a day in the city.
- Just steps away on Main Street you will find several Hair Salons, a Nail Salon and Spa on Main which offers massages, facials, and waxing.
